## How to make lego weapons for beginners

You're looking at a 92FS replica built entirely by LEGO. Impressive, right? Well, you can put yours together, too. That's it. This is from Jeff Boen's The BrickGun Book, which is a building guide for the natural-sized LEGO guns, including 1911, BG22 with Magazine, Desert Eagle, MAC-11 and 92FS. Boen runs the popular BrickGun.com site and is known among LEGO manufacturers for its incredibly accurate replica brick guns. For Boen, this is his favorite creation of BrickGun, noting how the real gun looks when the slide is back. "When I built the first BrickGun model it was just to see if I could come with something that seemed vaguely like the classic 92 gun," Boen writes on BrickGun.com "Once I decided to add mechanical functions in motion I never dreamed where it would lead. I had no idea she'd become the thing that I'm probably best known for. " Above, it is possible as the 92FS, a gun that appeared in numerous video games, compares with its brick counterpart. Here's how to build your own: Note that replica of the brick handgun does not shoot bullets — before it is designed to do so. LEGO or not, this topic may not appeal to all tastes. As the main model builder for Legoland Discovery Center Michigan, Parry works in an office full of 250,000 Lego bricks sorted by size and color. It's most of his building in front of a crowd. When Parry created a Lego version of the city of Detroit, thousands of Legoland visitors every day looked at his every move. Parry, an Eagle Scout, says he regularly draws the skills he learned in scouting. He points to merit badges such as Sculpture, Model Design and Construction, and Engineering. "Any badge that makes you think about how objects look or work in three-dimensional space can be useful," he says. "When I build a bridge or a tower for a crane, it brings me back to the summer camp and the pioneering merit badge." Here are the best tips of Parry for the construction of best Lego creations. 1. FOCUS ON COLOR If you are building a car or a spaceship or an animal, using the right colors makes your design more professional. "But remember, work with what you have and become creative," says Parry. "Don't let a limited number of pieces hold you back." Remember, also, that the outer layer is all that people will see. Let's say you're building a polar bear, but you don't have a giant white brick basket. Make the inside any color you want and cover only the outside in white. 2. Watch the real world Ready to bring your creations to the next level? Parry recommends looking for objects to recreate. "Buy small and real objects with natural size, as aor video game controller," Parry says. "I like to joke about my colleagues leaving a fake Lego dagger out on the desk for them to try to use when they are not paying attention!" 3. TRY OUT CURVS To be a master builder, Parry says you will need to master the curves. It is not easy, because the Lego bricks are mostly square and rectangular. "A simple way to do it is with graph paper and something around, like a bowl," Parry says. "Track a circle on the grid and follow the pattern you made." 4. IGNORE THE STRUCTURES (SOMETIME) Don't always stick to the instructions. Lego designs are amazing, but what you have in your mind could be much cooler. Parry remembers her favorite Lego started growing: a series of short films called "Time Cruisers", where Lego crushed astronauts, pirates, Vikings and other sets. Parry describes it as The Lego Movie — only two decades before Emmet, Lucy and Batman hit the big screen. Remember to cut out different sets to create new stories, ships and adventures. 5. Think of inconvenience The most unusual pieces in Lego set can be played for other things. If you look closely, the Minifigure binoculars make large air horns on the top of an exhaust truck. "What I paid more attention to the film Lego is the way they use Lego pieces," says Parry. Parry says a master builder is more than a good manufacturer. He or she is an artist, also, looking for inspiration everywhere. "I'm just sittingthe car driving long, and I see the way a trim line on a car looks and be like, 'I have a piece Lego in my head that re-create it beautifully,' he says. That's the other way, too. "Sometimes I look at a piece of Lego, and I will be like, 'This looks like the fin out of a dolphin' or 'This looks like the crest of the eyebrow from a Klingon by Star Trek!'" 6. "When I have a lot of something, like my most standard bricks, I ordered so that each basket is its color and piece," Parry says. "For example: 1-by-1 white, 2-by-2 red, 2-by-8 blue." For unique pieces, forget the color and simply order for part. A hinges drawer, one for doors, one for Minifigure accessories.
